Coordinators Teleconference

Jim explained that he would like to hear feedback on what others thought of the conference they were at during the end of May 2022. He said that there is talk about having another conference next year but possibly more central, maybe Casper WY. Jim stated that during the conference there was discussion about the Fall Learning Series and that anyone can participate. There is discussion about getting rid of Five Points data system and hoping to end this June 2023. There are people actively pursuing other providers as Five Points is not showing the data that is wanted. They looked up an example from Laramie and there were discrepancies. It was also shared that there are 18 Drug Courts in Wyoming. Campbell County JFDC shows to have served a maximum of 8 participants, minimum of 5 participants, and average of 7 participants in the first quarter. In the second quarter, Campbell County JFDC shows to have served a maximum of 7 participants, minimum of 5 participants, with an average of 5.8 participants. JR explained that he looks through the jail roster daily, so he can reach out as JFDC does not want anyone to fall through the cracks.

FY23 Funding

CJSB- The contract was sent to Char, HR, and the Grant Specialist, in which there were questions about the insurance. The contract isn't back yet to present to the commissioners. The city hasn't said anything about the funds applied for; except for the provisional letter that was sent.

Budget Update-

By the end of this week, the budget update will be emailed to the board. Jim explained that JFDC used Quality of Life funds to assist in participants getting groceries, helped pay for 1 month in rent, bought a couple of the participants clothes that needed them, paid for a past due and current phone bill, and purchased an air mattress and cooking pot for a male participant. All that is left to be purchased is a couple of rec center passes and a gas card.

Trainings

Judge Kim Hoff felt that the training in May 2022 was fantastic and that this is the best training so far about recovery capital and THC. DaNece enjoyed the breakout sessions that took place between the Judges and Attorneys where they can discuss amongst themselves about the topic they were discussing. Dawn Rech said that it was very informative, and she was able to gain more knowledge on what Drug Court is. The only concerning issue for Dawn is that she was the only Law Enforcement present at this conference. Jim discussed his appreciation of the commitment everyone on the Board has to our kids and families in Campbell County. He had heard other counties speak about having a difficult time getting their Judge to staffing. There was also discussion about how JFDC came about working with YITS as well. He described the conversations as phenomenal networking. During this training, everyone also learned about the different strains of THC such as Delta 8 and Delta 10. It was discussed how these are now legal and there isn't anything anyone can do about it. DaNece mentioned that during a court hearing recently, there were conditions put in the bond conditions stating that they were not allowed to go to any head shops, which DaNece found interesting. DaNece would like to see CCSD partner up with the gentleman that spoke at the conference and went undercover to different head shops. It would be beneficial to have him come and speak to the juveniles in this community. In Salt Lake City it was found that there are second graders vaping and have education on vaping in the schools. DaNece said that this is the best CLE she has attended. A lady from Colorado came to the conference and spoke about how her son committed suicide. He had been using Dabs and ended up having a psychotic break. DaNece said that this psychosis is a real thing and how marijuana is no longer just marijuana anymore. It was also discussed that it is still up in the air on where JFDC will stand such as if it will be under Judiciary or Department of Health. Jim also brought up redoing a self-study evaluation again as the last one done was in 2018. He will email the self-study evaluation to the board.

Other Business

There was discussion about the terms for the board members and how some have become expired. No one on the board opted out and Dawn Rech said she wanted to be a part of the board. Char, Rita, and Ryan's terms have expired. DaNece's term expires 2024. Jim Lyon, Kim Hoff, and Heidi Phipps terms expire in 2022. Sally Craig and Bonnie Volk's term expires in 2023. The Commissioner's terms are renewed every other year.

DaNece made motion to adjourn this meeting, Heidi seconded, and all were in favor. Meeting adjourned.
